## Newark Cursillo Aids Metuchen Diocese Cursillo Re-Launch

Tony Tangorra, Lay Director of the Metuchen Diocese Cursillo, reached out to Joe Clark, Lay Director of the Newark Archdiocese Cursillo last summer, seeking advice on how Metuchen could revitalize and re-launch their then-dormant Cursillo movement. A meeting was arranged and attended in August by Joe, Tony, Assistant Lay Director Pat Carr and former Newark Lay Director Bob Oeschlin.

At the gathering, Tony expressed that he had met with Metuchen Diocese Bishop Paul Bootkoski and that he had been charged with bringing the Metuchen Cursillo back to life by planning and executing a Women's and Men's Weekend for winter 2009. Known Cursillistas within the Metuchen Diocese had been contacted and teams were about to be put into place. As Tony had never personally helmed a Weekend in the Rector role, he was particularly grateful for the knowledge and insights he gained at the meeting.



Tony shared that space had already been booked at the Blue Army Shrine in East Asbury, NJ (near Hackettstown) for a late January Women's Weekend and late February Men's Weekend. As teams had at that point not yet been formed, it was particularly important for that milestone in the Weekend planning process to get started and off on the right foot. Tony's home base, St. James in Basking Ridge, fortunately had parishioners who had made Cursillo and were willing to act as a core team to help initiate the Men's Weekend planning process.

One thing established at the meeting was that the Newark Cursillo volunteered

to recruit Support Team members as an aid to Metuchen. Support Team as a concept was a new one to Tony. The Metuchen's Women's Team did indeed take us up on our offer and a Newark Support Team made up of our own women Cursillistas acted as an aid in reviewing and critiquing talks and offering advice where they saw fit, much to the appreciation of the Metuchen Women's Team.

The January Metuchen Women's Weekend, incidentally helmed by Rector Marie Pearce, a former Newark Cursillista from Our Lady of the Lake, Verona that relocated to the Metuchen Diocese, went off with great success. They were very appreciative of all the help provided by the women of the Newark movement.

As for the Metuchen Men's Weekend, that went off as planned at the end of February, a few weeks ago. Newark Cursillista Rich Rafanello from St. Philomena, Livingston, served on Team under Rector

Andy Chabak, presenting the Study talk. Rich is a personal friend of Tony Tangorra and was recruited by Tony to serve on Team. The weekend was blessed

with fifteen Candidates, including a priest and two deacons. All shared at the Closing.

Jim Garabo, a western New Jersey Cursillista who had served the Newark movement as a Music Minister on Team last year, was particularly pleased to see the Metuchen Cursillo take flight, as he resides in that diocese. Jim helped this past Metuchen Men's Weekend with their music program, acting as Music Director, and performed at the Closing ceremony and Mass. He also successfully recruited a bunch of his Newark Men's 174<sup>th</sup> teammates as well as a few other men from the Newark movement, nine in all, to come to

the Metuchen Men's Closing, acting as the Men's Choir for the event. They were: Jim Clough, Gerry DiMauro, Dennis Christiansen, Pat Ferrara, Pat Carr, Bob Cenar (with trumpet), Ken Bransfield, Bill Dougherty and Pete Fusco.

Here is what Jim Clough shared via e-mail to this impromptu Men's Choir that performed at the Closing:

*Guys -*

*What can I say? Your presence at yesterday's closing was a testimony to your love for our Lord. Being there and singing with you brought back many fond memories of our weekend together last year and once again rekindled my spirit. I believe that we had a positive effect not only on the candidates who were there yesterday but the team as well. Fr. Ron was very pleased.*

*I know those men (and ladies) were just blown away by the love that we showed them. The singing was indeed heavenly. That is the spirit of Cursillo. For those of you who couldn't be there, we missed you and your presence was nevertheless felt among us all.*

## On Blessings of this Lenten Season

As some of you know this past year I have encountered a few challenges. I have also been graced with many blessings including being on team, becoming a grandfather, and having a Cursillo community that has lifted me up and given me more support than I ever thought possible. (Should I have been surprised?) GOD never ceases to amaze me and show me how much He loves me! So this year I have been looking forward to this Lenten journey and to show God how much I appreciate all the blessings he pours out on me and my loved ones on a second by second basis. I wanted to do something special to gain a closer relationship with Jesus when I came across the Lenten addition of a daily devotional called "The Word Among Us" (WAU.org). I believe it was God reaching out to me with yet another blessing. There were several good articles in this periodical and here are some of the highlights and what I have learned.

Ash Wednesday begins our Lenten journey -- traditionally a forty-day period to examine and renew our spiritual life. It is a time of prayer, service, and fasting. The forty days recall the forty years that the people of Israel wandered in the wilderness before arriving at the Promised Land and the forty days that Jesus spent in the wilderness after being baptized.

On Ash Wednesday, we receive ashes that remind us of our nature as created beings (Gen 3:19). This practice echoes the Old Testament tradition of wearing ashes as a sign of anguish and repentance. As the ash cross is made on our forehead we hear words that echo John the Baptist's call to conversion, "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the gospel". We respond "Amen" meaning "So be it."

Than I went to the cross. It is far more than two beams of wood joined together. It is big enough and impor-

tant enough to contain the whole of Jesus' passion, death and resurrection. It is the central point of our whole Christian life! If I think I am going to heaven because I deserve it than I am seriously mistaken. No one can. Christ came not to abolish the law but to fulfill it! He was the perfect sin offering, the un-blemished lamb who God sent to save me, because he loves me that much, so unworthy of his love, because he knows that I can not save myself, only by the blood of his perfect son. What kind of God do we have that is majestic enough to create the entire universe yet loves this sinner enough



to sent His only son to trade a throne in heaven for a cross to save me? Christ conquered evil with love via the cross!

St. Paul knew how important it is. In Gal. 6:14 he said "May I never boast except in the cross of our lord Jesus Christ, through which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world." And Paul had plenty to boast about!

When I choose to act in a way that is opposed to Jesus, the cross becomes a stumbling block for me. When Peter heard Jesus talking about the cross, he took him aside and said "God forbid" which Jesus replied "Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle to me. You are thinking not as God does, but as humans do." (Matt. 16:22) I want to embrace the cross, not stumble on it. I want to do the Father's will, not my will. What is it we chide each other, if you want to make God laugh, tell him your plan?

Jesus came into this world so that He could lay down His life for us on the cross. His victory is our victory. How can we ever honor Him for what He did for us? I will meditate on the cross every day. I will turn to Him in prayer. I will tell Jesus that I am a sinner and that I am grateful for the price that He paid for us on the cross. There is power in Jesus' cross - a power that is available to everyone who asks. So let us glory in the cross of Christ so that we can live in the victory that Jesus won for us! So if I am blessed to see you during our Lenten journey, a time of prayer, service and fasting, and I appear to be smiling, you'll know why.
